Résumé

ALICE H. AMSDEN is Barton L. Weller Professor of Economic Development at the Massachusetts Institute of Technology. In 2009 she was appointed by the Secretary-General of the U.N., Ban Ki-Moon, to a three-year seat on the U.N. Committee on Development Policy. She was chosen in 2002 as one of the Top 50 Visionaries by Scientific American Magazine for her book, *The Rise of the Rest: Challenges to the West from Late-Industrializing Economies* (Oxford University Press, 2001). Joseph Stiglitz, Nobel Laureate in Economics, commented: "This is a masterful book that challenges the dominant paradigm of late industrialization." Her newest book, translated in Korean and Japanese, is *Escape from Empire: The Developing World's Journey Through Heaven and Hell*, MIT Press, 2007, for which she was interviewed on Public Radio International.

Amsden has been a consultant on industrial development for the UN, World Bank, OECD and numerous governments. She previously taught at Harvard Business School and the Graduate Faculty of the New School for Social Research. She has contributed pieces to *The New York Times*, *The Nation*, *World Policy Journal*, *Technology Review*, *Milken Institute Review*, *Mother Jones*, and other popular newspapers and magazines.

Amsden was born in New York City. She received her bachelor's degree from Cornell and her master's and PhD degrees from the London School of Economics. She is currently working on a book entitled, *A Farewell to Ideology: Developing From Role Models*.
